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President's column

Often people ask me how I got interested in Horatio Alger and in the Horatio Alger Society, and I think it all started when someone gave me a copy of *Fame and Fortune* [Winston, with Coates on spine, not a first] when I was no more than 11 or 12. Aspects of that novel, second in the Ragged Dick Series, drew me to seek out more Algers, which were not that readily available in the late 1950s. One misperception arose from Richard ("Ragged Dick") Hunter's awful jokes: that Alger had at least some kind of a sense of humor. Aside from those jokes, you can search long and hard for more in the other 100-plus titles.

More significant was the picture of New York City that Alger painted in the 1860s, both of the well-off stopping at fancy hotels and the poor, living in rough locales like the Five Points. I grew up no more than a half hour's train ride from the City and already was exploring its many fascinations, so searching for where these characters had traveled almost a century earlier was great fun.

Even though New York City was well on its way to becoming the nation's greatest metropolis in Alger's day — by the turn of the 20th century, it had reached, as the title of O.Henry's story collection attests, *The Four Million* — it was a compact world of its own, from the old Astor Hotel on what is now lower Broadway to the prisons on far-off Blackwell's Island, now Roosevelt Island.

Alger, of course, provides through his picture of the have-nots of this age, an antidote to an overly rosy view of that era, or the wildly inaccurate way some would remember the 19th century, as Frank Sullivan satirized in "The Night the Old Nostalgia Burned Down" ... "back when 23rd Street was where 14th Street is now..."

When visiting family in Philadelphia, I discovered the wonderful Leary's Book Store, then inhabiting its own five-story building at 9 South Ninth Street. I marveled at the three massive shelves of Algers that a clerk off-handedly pointed out to me in responding to my inquiry, not that I was then aware that I would never see such a large collection for sale apart from Horatio Alger Society auctions and the Northern Illinois University repository.

Again, I lucked out in that one of the two volumes I was able to purchase then with my saved-up allow-

2016 convention report

'Back home again in Indiana'

Spring in Indiana is a welcome time for residents and visitors alike, and so it was for the Horatio Alger Society for its 52nd annual convention, "Back home again in Indiana," on April 28-May 1, 2016.

This year is the bicentennial of Indiana statehood, and the H.A.S. was able to soak up a bit of Hoosier history when it visited the Edinburgh-Columbus area. This is

the Society's fifth convention in Indiana dating back to 1973, a record for a single state, and for the third time since 2007, Wendy and Bob Sipes were the congenial hosts.

Our convention hotel, the Edinburgh Holiday Inn Express & Suites, was conveniently located in Indiana's South-Central region on Interstate 65, less than an hour south of Indianapolis In-

ternational Airport and a leisurely 90-minute drive to downtown Louisville, Kentucky. And, as has been noted in recent issues of **Newsboy**, downtown Columbus, Indiana (just 10 minutes from the hotel) is one of the nation's showplaces for award-winning contemporary architecture.

Those choosing to arrive a day early were greeted by ideal weather on Wednesday afternoon, the early arrivals including your editor, former president and current treasurer Barry Schoenborn — and driving in from the east — Bob Eastlack and Keith Thompson. Adjacent to the hotel were two major shopping attractions, the Edinburgh Premium Outlets and the Exit 76 Antique Mall with more than 500 dealer spaces (including a large number of booksellers). Also, several restaurants were within easy walking distance from the Holiday Inn.

Thursday, April 28

As more Partic'lar Friends started to arrive, there was plenty of time to take in Columbus' stunning architecture or drive a half hour to the historic town of Nashville, with its vintage streetscapes, antique stores and gift shops.

Hosts Wendy and Bob Sipes had the meeting/hospitality room open by early afternoon, with plenty of free refreshments (along with the hotel's coffee bar in the adjacent lobby). Boxes of books for the following day's annual auction were brought into the room, and the display tables were nearly fully set up by late afternoon, allowing potential buyers an early look.

Following adjournment of the meeting, members were free the remainder of the day

and evening for dinner on their own and socializing in the hotel lounge and lobby.

Friday, April 29

The hotel's complimentary breakfast included a wide selection, and members were in the hotel lounge as early as 7 a.m. eating and socializing. The day's formal program got underway shortly before 9 a.m. in the conference room, which had its chairs rearranged for the occasion. Bob Sipes made his official "welcome" remarks, followed by the same from President Jeff Looney.

An introduction to the guest speakers followed, with Bill Gowen leading off with a talk titled "Laurie York Erskine Rides North with Renfrew," a presentation about Erskine's writing career and his popular series of adventure books centered around the Royal Canadian Mounted Police's Douglas Renfrew, illustrated with slides.

Sipes made the second presentation (again, using color projections), titled "British Boys Books and their Authors." The authors included Mayne Reid, W.H.G. (Continued on Page 5)

Editor's notebook

Another convention is in the history books, and now we can look forward to the experience of traveling to the West Coast next year, as former president and current treasurer Barry Schoenborn has already laid the groundwork for our visit to Sacramento, California. Barry has floated the idea of hosting a convention for several years, and finally, the time is right. And, it's fair to him, as he has traveled long distances over the past decade to come to conventions in the Midwest and on the East Coast. Really, he deserves a break from years of red-eye flights and car rentals.

It has been asked many times, can a California convention attract enough Partic'lar Friends, the bulk of whom live elsewhere in the USA? Well, we can only look at history. Our conventions in Scottsdale, Arizona, in 1998, and Salt Lake City, Utah, in 2002, had among the highest attendance in recent years, 69 and 42 registrants, respectively. Yes, our overall membership was greater in those days, but those were still very successful conventions. And let's face it — the last two conventions, held in the heartland of our country, had disappointing turnouts. When we sounded out the attendees at the just-concluded Indiana convention, the vote was nearly unanimous in support of Sacramento.

Right now (today!) you can visit the official H.A.S. website and see the early fruits of Barry's labor. He has selected the downtown La Quinta Inn & Suites, a short walk from Sacramento's Old Town district. The room rate is targeted at 80 bucks (two double beds), the meeting room fulfills our needs, and there is a shuttle to and from the airport that will also give rides to Old Town or the State Capitol building. This editor prefers not to rent a car, so this setup is ideal. The convention will be our traditional weekend prior to Mother's Day weekend.

Barry will be promoting this convention heavily, both on our website and in **Newsboy**. We want it to be a success, so we are asking many of you who have not attended a convention in the past (or did so only off and on) to give it a try. Also, this is a great opportunity for West Coast members to come to a convention without traveling a great distance.

A final note about our recent visit to Indiana. You missed a great time, and the auction offered some fine books. The food was excellent and the opportunity to re-acquaint ourselves with old friends is one of the main reasons for these get-togethers. Please join us in 2017!

ance money was *Chester Rand*. Given Alger's extremely limited abilities as a plot creator, many H.A.S. members have attested to the unusually strong characterizations in that novel.

Along with other popular authors of early juvenile literature, Alger was victimized by the movement launched by "right-thinking," elitist librarians in the late 19th and early 20th centuries who also banished the likes of Henty, Optic, Ellis, Castlemon, and all the Stratemeyer creations from public libraries. This movement has more recently been chronicled but it was alive and well when I was in school when an English teacher told me I could not write a book report on an Alger novel "because it is a second-rate book." (That brings back legendary **New Yorker** editor Harold Ross's defense of James Thurber when another artist asked why the magazine turned down his work while publishing the cartoons of "that fifth-rate artist Thurber." "Third-rate," Ross snapped, coming stoutly to Thurber's defense.)

That Alger likely sold more books than anyone ever had — in those cheap editions that were marketed at a dime or 15 cents each — did not endear him to the guardians of the academy any more than have the millions of mass-market paperbacks purchased in our own time. Academic interest eventually developed in so-called "popular culture" as even the definition of history broadened to include study of literature of all varieties. Carol Nackenoff's *The Fictional Republic* explored Alger's influence from an historian's vantage point.

Frank Gruber's article, later republished in pamphlet form (and available for sale at several of our recent auctions), was an early effort to bring serious organization and even some analysis to the Alger oeuvre. I happened to see it when I was just becoming interested in Alger as an American literary phenomenon. It's long been outdated as a reference by Bennett and Gardner, as well as Mattson & Davis, as well as Brad Chase's detailed studies, but it had its moment.

Soon thereafter, a friend who worked at the Metropolitan Museum of Art spotted a reference to the Horatio Alger Society in **Antiquarian Bookman**, then the trade paper for the old books field. Passing it on to me, he observed, "I figured you'd be interested in this."

Thus, my initiation into the world of Alger; and then I attended my first convention, way back in 1981 in Bowie, Maryland, hosted by Bob Williman, where I first enjoyed the company, among many others, of Ralph Gardner and Brad Chase. All three were front and center the next year when issuance of the Alger

Kingston, R.M. Ballantyne, Robert Louis Stevenson, G.A. Henty, George Manville Fenn, F.S. Brereton and Percy F. Westerman. He discussed these men and their books, along with an introduction on how he began collecting British boys' books.

The third presentation was somewhat of a departure, but especially interesting and informative. Guest speaker Andrew Lannerd's talk, "Royal Encounters and Collecting," covered his more than three decades devoted to following (mainly in person) the activities of British royalty, in particular Queen Elizabeth II, now in her 64th year as monarch. Lannerd's display of royal memorabilia included several framed historic photographs as well as preserved pieces of cake from formal royal occasions.

Following a short coffee break, the meeting room chairs were rearranged for the afternoon auction as well as the annual business meeting, which started at about 11 a.m. President Jeff Looney gave a brief summary of the previous afternoon's Board of Directors meeting. The first item of business was a discussion led by Looney about recent years' difficulty in finding convention hosts, along with the declining attendance at conventions, both tied to the shrinking of our roster, mainly due to the increasing age of our membership.

As for the 2017 convention, it was announced that Barry Schoenborn had volunteered to be the host in Sacramento, California, and that the directors had reacted positively in deciding to bring Sacramento to a vote before the membership in attendance. Schoenborn noted that the convention would be held the weekend before Mother's Day in 2017, his research showed that the hotel would be affordable, with plenty of historic sites in and near the California state capital.

James King (PF-1126) also stated he would consider hosting a future convention in Florida, and said he would

look into locations for 2018 that would fit our criteria as to affordability, convenience of air travel and interesting places to visit. He said he will report back to the Society president and board of directors in the coming months, so that a firm commitment can be made in advance.

Bob Sipes moved that we hold our 2017 convention in Sacramento, with the motion seconded by Art Smitter. A show of hands to the question "Will you travel to California for a convention?" was unanimous, and the verbal "ayes" carried the vote.

Next on the agenda was a discussion of the Horatio Alger Society's constitution and by-laws, last revised in 2000 and in need of an update, due mainly to the evolving structure and future needs of the Society. Barry Schoenborn was appointed chairman of the Constitution and By-Laws Committee, whose membership also includes

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commemorative postage stamp highlighted our annual convention at Willow Grove, Pennsylvania.

In those days, since Alger titles brought high prices at the convention auctions and book sales, I felt like I was back in Leary's in Philly, marshalling my allowance to afford to buy. Demands of work and other obligations kept my attendance at H.A.S. conventions erratic until recent years, but there were plenty of good times all along the way.

Next time: some thoughts on what we have to do to keep Alger and the Horatio Alger Society engaged in the 21st century.

Jeff Looney, President, called the meeting to order at 4:30 p.m. No old issues were noted.

In new business, Barry Schoenborn, Treasurer, presented the annual financial report. Gross income for the previous 12 months was \$7,477.02 and expenses were \$8,305.58, resulting in a net loss of \$828.56 for the fiscal year ending April 30, 2016. The loss can be attributed to lower H.A.S. auction proceeds (\$601.80) from the 2015 H.A.S. convention auction. Total cash on hand includes \$9,698.87 in checking deposits and \$9,064.55 in a certificate of deposit for a total of \$18,763.42.

While our year-over-year losses have been small, with a few gains, we need to promote our annual convention and auction to ensure our convention breaks even and the auction proceeds result in gains rather than losses. In support of this we must concentrate on increasing membership, promote the Sustaining Membership option and to continue soliciting high-quality auction material for future conventions.

The regular *Strive & Succeed Award* fund income for the previous 12 months totaled \$1,590. The board voted to award \$1,000 to the recipient selected by the convention host. It was noted that there were no *Strive & Succeed Award* donations made online.

Robert Sipes, Executive Director, reported total membership at 124. This includes 93 Regular members, 11 Sustaining members, six Life, four Honorary and 10 Libraries. There were four new members added during the previous 12 months and 14 drops for a net loss of 10 members. The precipitous drop over the past year is a change from the relative stability of the previous five years. Of the 14 lost members, at least four were due to death, one was a normal honorary drop and the remainder were most likely the result of increased age and/or lack of interest. Two current members renewed their membership online.

The chart, above, provides a comparison of membership over the past six years and shows how our overall membership has remained relatively stable.

Robert Sipes commented that we carry members who are past due on membership dues for months before dropping them. Most end up catching up their dues; however, we currently have nine members who are greater than six months in arrears. This can skew the membership numbers and affects the overall cash flow.

Robert Sipes also reviewed our online social media presence. The H.A.S. Facebook page is slowly growing in membership. However, due to low level of membership activity on the page, our overall reach is very limited. We currently have 125 Facebook members who have liked the H.A.S. page and receive updates. This is up nine from last year at this time. Many of these Facebook members are not H.A.S. members. Although the level of activity on the H.A.S. page is very low, when a member posts some content, there is a small level of activity implying that increased content would result in increased activity. The level of activity is an increase over the previous years.

Sipes also provided some membership statistics for print publications and social media groups similar to the Horatio Alger Society. The statistics are provided below:

There was lively discussion regarding how to increase both institutional and personal memberships. The consensus was that increased online activity would improve the name recognition of the H.A.S. and attract new members. As Barry Schoenborn and Robert Sipes provide most of the Facebook content, they agreed to increase their H.A.S. online activity and Robert will investigate the cost of Facebook advertising and bring a recommendation back to the H.A.S. Board.

Sipes also provided a status regarding the H.A.S. repository library, which remains robust. Northern Illinois University added a handful of titles and continues to provide scans and other reproductions to H.A.S. members upon request. The endowment is stable with a balance as of April 2016 of \$50,764.39, down from \$52,667.43 in 2015, but still up from \$45,790.37 in 2014. Since FY 16 ends June 30, there will be \$2,218.18 left expendable. This will be added to the projected FY 17 amount of \$1976.30 resulting in a FY 17 expendable amount of \$4,194.48. Rare Books and Special Collections curator Lynne Thomas is offering two fellowships in FY 17 (post-July 1) at \$2,000 each.

Barry Schoenborn proposed hosting the 2017 H.A.S. convention in Sacramento, California. He extolled the many wonderful sites to visit, the downtown location, reasonable room rates, and expectation that many would attend. The venue was unanimously approved, and 13 members present confirmed their intention to attend the 2017 convention, which was sent to a formal vote of the membership at the following day's business meeting. We will advertise and promote the West Coast location in hopes of attracting additional attendance from members west of the Mississippi.

The Nominating Committee Report was presented by Barry Schoenborn. The nominees were as follows: Richard Hoffman for President, Cary Sternick for Vice President, Barry Schoenborn for Treasurer, Jack Bales for director filling one of the vacant 2018 positions, Robert Eastlack for director, Carol Nackenoff for Director, and Bob Petitto for Director. The directors will serve three-year terms. This leaves one director position vacant (expires in 2018).

There had been much discussion prior to the board meeting and during the board meeting regarding the current number of directors. The prevailing opinion is that we need to reduce the number of directors from nine to six; although, there were some who questioned the rationale. This reduction; however, requires a change to the Constitution and By-Laws (Article VI, Section 1) reducing the number of directors to six. The Board approved a motion to review and update the By-Laws and Constitution during the next fiscal year and request approval at the annual board meeting during the 2017 H.A.S. Convention.

Barry Schoenborn will chair the Constitution and By-Laws Committee, which will review the need to reduce the Board to a membership of six (along with other modifications) and present recommendations to the Board and membership prior to the 2017 H.A.S. Convention. These proposed revisions

will be published in the January-February 2017 Newsboy.

Robert Sipes, Convention Host, reported that the current registered attendance was 17 with a break-even cost basis of 25 registrants. He reported that the conference was expected to lose money, and that while we had nice auction material, the low number of bidders might impact the auction results. Robert discussed adjustments he and Wendy had made to reduce the loss.

Robert Huber and Barry Schoenborn, H.A.S. Webmasters, reported that a considerable amount of content created by Robert Eastlack has been added to the website by Robert and Barry. There was some concern regarding the amount of storage we have available and the potential costs if we need to increase the volume of available storage. Barry will investigate and provide a status to the Board. Additional discussion ensued regarding adding content related to other authors to boost visitors to the site and potentially increase membership. Jeff Looney, outgoing President, commented that providing content for the Ralph Henry Barbour page would be a priority for him in the near future. All in attendance agreed with many volunteering support for various authors.

The **Newsboy** Report was given by William R. Gowen, Editor. The print run for **Newsboy** has for the past year been 155 issues and will be reduced immediately to 140. The total annual expense for producing **Newsboy** has remained relatively stable during the past decade. The primary reason is managing the print run based on membership to balance the increase in postage and printing costs. Total cost per issue increased from \$3.67 to \$4.55 for the previous 12 months. This was primarily due to printing two full-color issues during the fiscal 2015-2016 year. Typically, one color issue is printed each year, but in this case an additional color issue was printed due to the significance of the content. A comparision of **Newsboy** expenses over the past five years is shown in the chart, below.

An honorarium of \$100 each to the Executive Director and **Newsboy** Editor was approved. President Looney adjourned the meeting at 6:30 p.m.



Robert Eastlack, Brad Chase and Joseph Strang.

The election of officers and directors was next on the agenda, and head of the nominating committee Barry Schoenborn reported the slate that had been assembled for a vote by the membership in attendance. For two-year terms as President, Richard B. Hoffman (PF-570); for Vice President, Cary Sternick (PF-933) and for Treasurer, Barry Schoenborn (PF-1087). For three-year terms as directors, terms ending in 2019 — Robert Eastlack (PF-557), Carol Nackenoff (PF-921) and Robert Petitto (PF-1086); and for a two-year extension to 2018, Jack Bales (PF-258). Sipes moved that we ratify the slate, the motion was seconded by Brad Chase and affirmed by voice vote.

In the traditional "passing of power" ceremony, Jeff Looney, in his last official act as president, turned over the podium to his successor, Dick Hoffman. "I attended my first convention 35 years ago, so it took a long time to get here," Hoffman said. "I look forward to serving as your president."

The meeting was adjourned, and the group quickly moved into the hotel's lounge for Friday's wonderful box lunch, prepared by a friend of Wendy Sipes.

Shortly following lunch, the annual consignment and donation auction took place in the main meeting room. Auctioneer Bob Huber moved the proceedings along briskly, with the 280-plus lots bid on in about four hours, including a mid-afternoon refreshment break. The auction concluded with an overall bidding total of \$2,689, including \$1,808 in consignment sales and \$881 in donations. The net auction proceeds to the Horatio Alger Society came to \$1,242.60, more than double that of the previous year [see complete auction results on Pages 9-13].

Following a break during late afternoon, the Partic'lar Friends gathered in the lobby and split up into car pools for the short drive to the Sirloin Stockade in Columbus. Our buffet dinner was assisted by a very friendly and helpful staff with beverages and other needs.

Saturday, April 30

Another excellent breakfast provided in the hotel lounge was followed by members setting up for the annual Saturday morning book sale, which ended slightly after 11 a.m. That left the remainder of the day for visiting the huge antique mall next door, or driving through downtown Columbus or historic Nashville enjoying the architecture. Lunch was on our own.

Following a leisurely afternoon spent shopping or

visiting area attractions, it was time to get ready for the annual H.A.S. awards banquet, held this year at The Seasons, located on the outskirts of the town of Nashville. Following Friday's routine, we gathered in the lobby and split up into members' cars for the 25-minute trip.

The buffet-style dinner was excellent, and the evening moved along nicely, with the awards portion getting underway while we enjoyed coffee and dessert. The main event each year is the presentation of the annual **Strive and Succeed Award**, and convention host Bob Sipes introduced this year's recipient, Isaac Trolinder, currently a law student. [Sipes' article about Isaac and his journey through life can be read on Page 15].

The annual H.A.S. awards followed. The **Carl Hartmann Luck and Pluck Award** was presented by incoming president Dick Hoffman to last year's convention host, Bob Huber. The **Richard Seddon Award** was presented to Brad Chase by last year's recipient, Bill Gowen, who noted that Chase was the only H.A.S. member at this convention who had known Seddon personally, and who helped to appraise Seddon's large Alger collection to be auctioned at the 1984 convention in Nashua, New Hampshire. Chase offered his recollection of the unique Partic'lar Friend who was Richard Seddon, one of the most admired members in the history of the Horatio Alger Society. Chase had received the Seddon Award once previously — 30 years ago, in 1986.

The **Newsboy Award** was presented by editor Bill Gowen in absentia to James D. Keeline (PF-898) of San Diego, California, for his literary contribution to the Society during the past year with his **Newsboy** article "A Fluent and Facile Style: Edward Stratemeyer Becomes the Literary Heir to Horatio Alger, Jr." The result of many years' research on Keeline's part, this detailed study of the so-called Stratemeyer Completions covered 30 pages over three consecutive issues, the longest article in the history of **Newsboy**.

The final award of the evening was a well-kept secret, as outgoing President Jeff Looney presented the **President's Award** to Wendy Sipes, who was hosting with her husband, Bob, her third H.A.S. convention.

Following the awards it was time for our keynote speaker, James Alexander Thom, noted Indiana author of historical fiction, whose far-ranging discussion was titled "A Funny Thing Happened on My Way to the Bestseller List." Following the banquet, the attendees gathered in the dining room to personally greet Trolinder and Thom, the latter inscribing one of his books.

It was time to return to the hotel following a long and memorable weekend, and the following morning we met in the lounge for the traditional Sunday farewell breakfast, before heading home and promising to go "Digging for Alger Gold" in Sacramento in 2017.
